Each of the first two types of agencies end with your death; an executor's responsibility begins at your death. And, a trustee (or successor trustee) can take over whenever you designate, in the trust agreement, on the conditions and terms that you establish.

Especially when helping your loved ones who are older than you, planning action should be taken now. An accident, stroke, or heart attack could cripple any one of us, any day, rendering us unable to make decisions for ourselves. If we wait until someone needs that power to decide, you might have to turn to the Probate Court. There, it is much more costly, and time-consuming, than if your loved one had given you that power before the event.

As with most things in life, planning for contingencies can relieves stress and uncertainty, as well as save money and heartache. Chart your course now.

Bringing the Green into March Meals

I like to use a lot of greens to highlight the basics this time of year. We always start up the grill in March, come rain, sleet, snow or sunshine. So, shovel the back deck and serve this to your favorite Leprechauns with plenty of stout beer. You can never go wrong with eggs, potatoes and sausages, true Irish fare. As always come to the table hungry and with a happy heart. Enjoy!

March Northern Michigan Peasant Meal

Appetizer: sliced Granny Smith apples and celery sticks with Sage Derby cheese and apple jam.

Potatoes: Cut potatoes into large bite-sized chunks. Cover with water in a cast iron pan and boil for five minutes. Drain the water and set aside the potatoes. Melt some bacon grease (butter or olive oil is okay here for the vegetarians). Add lots of chopped garlic and parsley, some sea salt and pepper and cook for a couple minutes on medium heat. Toss the potatoes back in the skillet, drizzle with olive oil and roast in the oven at 350° until golden crispy (or put them on the grill). Add parmesan cheese or sour cream and more parsley for the finale.

Eggs: Scramble eggs with a touch of cream and Dijon mustard. Cook slightly, then add fresh baby

spinach leaves and green olives. Cook on low heat. Top with blue cheese crumbles or Sage Derby cheese.

Brats: Boil the brats in a stout beer for ten minutes then throw on the grill. For the brat sauce mash an avocado with lime juice, mayo and horseradish mustard.

Side dish: Biscuits smothered in green lentils and tomatoes.

Dessert: Shamrock Sugar Cookies with Lime Green Frosting (this is what you ask the guests to bring!)
